**Professor
Daniel A. Bell**

Daniel A. Bell (贝淡宁) is Chair Professor of Political Theory with the Faculty of Law at the University of Hong Kong. He has recently completed a five year term as Dean of the School of Political Science and Public Administration at Shandong University (Qingdao).

His latest book is *The Dean of Shandong*, to be published by Princeton University Press in 2023. His books include *Just Hierarchy* (with Wang Pei), *The China Model*, *China's New Confucianism*, *Beyond Liberal Democracy*, *East Meets West* and *The Spirit of Cities* (co-authored with Avner de-Shalit), all published by Princeton University Press. He is founding editor of the Princeton-China series (Princeton University Press) which translates and publishes original and influential academic works from China. His works have been translated in 23 languages. In 2018, he was awarded the Huilin Prize and was honored as a "Cultural Leader" by the World Economic Forum. In 2019 he was awarded the Special Book Award of China.



**Professor
Jin Canrong**

Jin Canrong is a professor and Associate Dean with the School of International Studies, Renmin University of China. He was also a visiting professor at the Gerald Ford School of Public Policy, University of Michigan, in 2003 and 2007, and the "Weilun" Chair Professor at Tsinghua University in 2006.

Before joining Renmin University, he worked for the Institute of American Studies at Chinese Academy of Social Sciences (CASS) from 1987 to 2002. He is also the Vice-President of China National Association of International Studies; Vice-President of the Pacific Society of China; Adviser to the Policy Planning Office, National People's Congress and the Standing Councilor to the China Reform Forum. His studies focus on American politics, American foreign policy, Sino-US relations and China's foreign policy and he is also the author of more than 100 academic papers, over 500 articles, 7 books and 5 translated books, incl.: *Liberal Tradition in America* by Louis Hart; *Between Hope and History* by President Bill Clinton and *Diplomacy* by Henry Kissinger.

Chandran Nair is the Founder and CEO of the Global Institute For Tomorrow (GIFT). An independent pan-Asian think tank based in Hong Kong and Kuala Lumpur, GIFT focuses on advancing a deeper understanding of global issues including the shift of economic and political influence from the West to Asia, the dynamic relationship between business and society, and the reshaping of the rules of global capitalism.

Chandran is the author of “Dismantling Global White Privilege: Equity for a Post-Western World”, “The Sustainable State: The Future of Government, Economy, and Society” and “Consumptionomics: Asia’s Role in Reshaping Capitalism and Saving the Planet”.

He is also the creator of “The Other Hundred”, a non-profit global photojournalism initiative to present counterpoints to media consensus on some of today’s most important issues.

Chandran was the chairman of Environmental Resources Management (ERM) in the Asia Asia-Pacific until 2004, establishing the company as Asia’s leading environmental consultancy.

Andrew Sheng is a former central banker and financial regulator in Asia and a commentator on global finance. He is Pro-Chancellor of Bristol University and Distinguished Fellow, Asia Global Institute, University of Hong Kong, as well as Chairman, George Town Institute of Open and Advanced Studies, Wawasan Open University, Malaysia. He has a First Class Honours in Economics from Bristol University, and Honorary Doctorates from University of Bristol and University of Malaya.

He is author of "From Asian to Global Financial Crisis" (Cambridge University Press 2009) and "Shadow Banking in China" (Wiley 2015). He writes regularly on international finance for Project Syndicate, AsiaNewsNet, Edge and Star. In April 2013, Andrew was named by Time magazine as one of the 100 most influential people in the world. He also appeared in the Oscar-winning film "Inside Job" in 2011

Eric Li is chairman of Chengwei Capital. He is founder of Guancha.cn and vice chairman of China Forum at Tsinghua University. He is a trustee of Fudan University's China Institute and chairman of its advisory council.

He also serves on the boards of Stanford University's Graduate School of Business, Asia Society Hong Kong, and the International Institute for Strategic Studies (IISS). He received his B.A. in economics from University of California, Berkeley, MBA from the Graduate School of Business at Stanford University, and Ph.D. in political science from Fudan University.

He is a frequent contributor to leading global publications such as Foreign Affairs, Foreign Policy, The New York Times, Financial Times, and The Economist.

Kiyoshi Kurokawa**

Kiyoshi Kurokawa is Professor Emeritus of the University of Tokyo, Tokai University and National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies

A graduate of the University of Tokyo School of Medicine, a physician; spent 15 years of his medical career at University of Pennsylvania, UCLA and University of Southern California; professor of Medicine at UCLA, University of Tokyo, Dean of Tokai University of Medical School; served as Vice President and President of Science Council of Japan (1996-2002), Science Advisor to Prime Ministers of Japan (2002-04, PM Abe and Fukuda), WHO commissioner (2005-09), foreign member of the US National Academy, Chair and Representative Director of Global Health Innovative Technology (GHIT: 2013-18) ; Chaired Fukushima Nuclear Accident Independent Investigation Commission by the National Diet of Japan, first time of this kind in Japan, awarded "2012 Scientific Freedom and Responsibility Award" of AAAS for this leadership. Currently, serve as Vice President of World Dementia Council created in 2013 by G8 Summit hosted by David Cameron; Chair of Corona Epidemic 'AI Analyses and Simulation' and Hideyo Noguchi Africa Prize, both of the Government of Japan; Chair of the Board of Health and Global Policy Institute, a top ranked independent think-tank in the world.



**Professor
Sor-Hoon Tan**

Sor-hoon Tan is Professor of Philosophy at Singapore Management University. Her research focuses on comparative studies of Confucianism and John Dewey's Pragmatism. She has worked in both the public and private sectors before returning to academia.

She is a member of the Singapore Bioethics Advisory Committee, Academic Advisor to the Nanyang Confucian Association, and a board member of the World Consortium for Research on Confucian Cultures. She serves on the editorial boards of various journals, including Philosophy East and West, Dao, Contemporary Pragmatism. She edited the Bloomsbury Research handbook on Chinese Philosophy Methodologies, and Challenging Citizenship: Group Membership and Cultural Identity in a Global Age. She is co-editor of Filial Piety in Chinese History and Thought, The Moral Circle and the Self: Chinese and Western Perspectives, Democracy as Culture: Deweyan Pragmatism in a Globalizing World, and Feminist Encounters with Confucius. Her works have appeared in Philosophy East and West, Dao: a Journal of Comparative Philosophy, Journal of Chinese Philosophy, Australasian Journal of Philosophy, Journal of Value Inquiry, Transactions of C.S. Peirce Society, Political Theory, and Contemporary Pragmatism, and other academic journals.

Dr. Daisy Wang

Daisy Yiyou Wang leads the Hong Kong Palace Museum's curation, research, exhibition planning and management, collection, conservation, publication, design, and learning programmes. Under the leadership of Dr. Louis Ng and Dr. Wang, the Museum team has collaborated with the Palace Museum to ensure the timely and successful delivery of nine high-quality opening exhibitions as well as the safety of over 1,000 priceless treasures from the Palace Museum, the Louvre Museum, and Hong Kong collections. A specialist of the history of art collecting, Ming lacquer, and Qing imperial portraiture and textile,

Dr. Wang has published internationally and received numerous awards, including a Getty Museum Leadership Fellowship, a National Endowment for the Humanities grant, and a Smithsonian Scholarly Studies Award. Dr. Wang co-curated the ground-breaking exhibition *Empresses of China's Forbidden City*, which was named the "Most Influential International Exhibition from Chinese Museums" in 2019 and the "Best Thematic/Historical Show" in 2018 by the Boston Globe. She co-edited this exhibition's catalogue, which received the Smithsonian Secretary's Research Prize. A leader in international museum professional exchange, she has served as the founding Chair of the American Alliance of Museum's China Program.



Einar Tangen

Einar Tangen is a Senior Fellow of the Center for International Business Ethics at UIBE and a Senior Fellow at the Taihe Institute. He has worn many hats as an author, a lawyer, banker, a consultant as well as serving as a board member at the village, City, State and National levels in the US and China.

Since 2010 Einar has been an active international TV and radio commentator on economic and political affairs, currently averaging approximately 700 appearances a year on Xinhua, CCTV, CGTN, CGTN America, National Public Radio, Al Jazeera English, News X India, WION, India, CNN World News 18 India, India Today, TRT World Turkey, Press TV Iran, News Asia, Singapore, Indus News, Pakistan, BBC, China Radio International and China.org.cn, Australian Broadcast Channel, among others.

Since 2005, Einar has resided in Beijing. In 2010 he wrote *The Kunshan Way*, which examined Kunshan's success as China's leading county-level city. In 2011, he became the principal of DGI/SMP Design, Beijing China, an international design group with 7 offices around the world, working in the area of urban infrastructure and design; In 2013, he founded China Cities Bluebook Consulting. In 2013, he wrote a business case study book on Beijing's Fengtai District. In 2022 he founded the Asia Narratives Channel. His latest book is a collaboration on American Exceptionalism and the decline of trust, which will be published shortly.

Ngeow Chow Bing is Director of the Institute of China Studies at the University of Malaya. Dr. Ngeow received his PhD in Public and International Affairs from Northeastern University. He is editor of *Populism, Nationalism and South China Sea Dispute* (Springer, 2022, with Nian Peng), *Researching China in Southeast Asia* (Routledge, 2019) and *Southeast Asia and China: A Contest in Mutual Socialization* (World Scientific, 2017, with Lowell Dittmer). His scholarly articles have been published in journals such as *Cold War History*, *Ocean Development and International Law*, *China Report*, *The China Review*, *Journal of Contemporary China*, *Asian Politics and Policy*, *Contemporary Southeast Asia*, *East Asia: An International Quarterly*, *Issues and Studies*, *Problems of Post-Communism*, and others. He has also contributed book chapters to numerous edited volumes, and published short pieces at online platforms such as *East Asia Forum*, *ThinkChina*, and *Carnegie Endowment for International Peace*. Dr Ngeow has written on a range of topics related to Chinese politics and history, including China-Malaysia relations, the South China Sea dispute, the Belt and Road Initiative, foreign policy of Taiwan, grassroots politics in China, and the politics of think tanks and intellectuals in China.

Vivian Lin is Executive Associate Dean and Professor of Public Health Practice at LKS Faculty of Medicine, The University of Hong Kong. She has 40 years of experience in public health, with a variety of leading roles in policy and programme development, health services planning, research and teaching, and senior administration in complex organizations.

She was previously Director of Health Systems in the Western Pacific Regional Office for the WHO and was Chair of Public Health at La Trobe University in Melbourne before serving the WHO. She has consulted widely for bilateral and multilateral organizations and served on numerous government and non-government boards in Australia and internationally. Vivian earned her BA from Yale University and MPH and DrPH from UC Berkeley.
