



White Privilege in sport runs deeper than the Euros

Chandran Nair grew up in postcolonial Malaysia, amid the nation's diverse racial and cultural composition. After attending university in the UK, he moved to southern Africa to do volunteer work on development issues. It was during this time that he became very interested in the nature of economic development, its relationship with geopolitics, and the nature of institutionalized racism.

He returned to Asia to pursue a career in environmental consulting, during which time he built Asia's largest environmental consulting group. Twenty years in consulting offered him an opportunity to work with many people from all parts of the world, both in government and the private sector. His experience led to an acute understanding of the norms and tensions of conducting business between the West and the Rest.

In particular, his first-hand experience of the inequalities of this relationship led him to the belief that the non-Western world should not be reliant on Western models of political and economic development, which have been designed in favour of a Western agenda. This belief prompted him to start a pan-Asian think tank in 2006 called the Global Institute for Tomorrow (GIFT),

which promotes a deeper understanding of the shift of influence from the West to Asia and focuses on what the needs of the post-Western world will be.

His views on issues in Asia and the developing world have been featured in the print media, ranging from the Financial Times, the Wall Street Journal and the New York Times to HuffPost, the Guardian, and China Daily. His opinions have been sought by an array of media outlets, including the BBC, CNN, NHK, Al Jazeera, CCTV, Bloomberg, and Channel News Asia, among others.

He sits on the executive committee of the Club of Rome, one of the world's premier scientific think tanks, and was one of the founding members of the Club of Rome China. He is an advisor to the Royal Cambodian government and is a fellow of the Royal Society of the Arts.

He is a keen sportsman and managed the Hong Kong field hockey team to two Asian Games. He plays the saxophone and used to be a member of an Afro-Jazz-Reggae band called *Imphandze* during his time in Africa; one of their albums, *Mlabalaba*, can be found on Spotify.
